

History Visit to Berlin

The first day of our trip started bright and early to meet at school for 2:30am, before we headed off, thoroughly awake and raring to go, for London City Airport. Luckily for us, the airport wasn't very busy so we were able to get through security pretty quickly, and after boarding our flight (be it slightly delayed), we got our first breath of German air after landing at the new Berlin Brandenburg Airport.

After dropping our bags off at our hotel, we started to explore the city, and visited a slew of Berlin's famous landmarks. We got our first glimpse of the Reichstag, before moving on to the Soviet War Memorial (surprising in former West Berlin), a towering statue that some have called to be taken down due to Russia's actions in Ukraine. Next, we walked past the iconic Brandenburg gate to the Memorial to the Murdered Jews of Europe, a poignant reminder to all of the crimes of the Nazi regime. However, this preceded a slightly more difficult-to-spot landmark, yet I think is equally indicative of the failure of Nazism - the Fuhrerbunker, or I should say, a piece of car park with no indication that perhaps the most evil human being to ever live spent his last days cowering from the Red Army in that very spot.

Finally, in arguably the highlight of day one, we were lucky enough to visit the Reichstag, the German parliament building. The top of the building is a beautiful glass dome that gives us a lovely view of the Berlin skyline in the evening, as well as a view down into where the Bundestag meets, which serves as a metaphor for transparency and democracy in Germany's government. We rounded off our first day with a visit to an old Nazi flak tower, which was in an unlit park, meaning it was slightly difficult to see the ugly concrete structure, and then we went to dinner, where we had pizza.

For day two, we thankfully started later, having our continental breakfast before heading to the Berlin Wall (or what's left of it), an iconic symbol of Germany's division and Cold War history, along with a museum with a tower that gave us a good view over the iconic landmark.

After a quick refreshment, we went to what was definitely one of my favourite parts of our trip, as we got a tour of two of Berlin's cold war era nuclear bunkers. We learned about how little protection these would have really provided in the event of nuclear war - even the purpose-built bunker would only last 14 days before the inhabitants would have to leave and navigate their way through a post-apocalyptic wasteland! The fact that there were tunnels in the u-bahn (underground) stations also surprised me, as I would have never thought that those doors around the station would have led to a bunker. We then had lunch, with myself having currywurst, which whilst I did enjoy, I can't claim to be the biggest fan of due to the copious amounts of curry powder added to the curry sauce.

Then, came in my opinion the best part of the whole trip, which was the DDR museum. We got to see scenes from life in East Germany; we learned about everything from the popular music in the DDR to the role of women and the life of the SED party members who ran the country. The museum took a very interesting perspective, both showing us both the political history, but also talking about how average people like us lived, an approach which I think helps to humanise people who are often ignored in favour of the grand battle that their nation partook in.

Next, we headed to the Berlin Dungeon, a very entertaining experience where we were able to relax and have fun after having done some heavier, more historical activities. After this, we headed to Alexanderplatz, one of Berlin's busiest squares, where we enjoyed schnitzel for dinner. I remember how striking the TV tower stretching into the sky seemed; the Soviets surely succeeded in making it look intimidating! We then ended the day with a walk down Unter





Day three we started off at the Sachsenhausen Concentration Camp. This was a very emotional place, knowing that so many people were put to work in harsh conditions, tortured and then cruelly murdered. Being at the location where thousands of innocent people stood was so surreal. It's difficult to describe how I felt walking around such a historical site. Everyone feels differently during such an experience, and unless you visit one of these monumental places yourself you'll never know how you truly feel, and how emotional it is.

After the concentration camp we had a guided tour around the Olympic Stadium which was very interesting. It was built by the Nazis to hold the 1936 Olympics and is still used today as a football stadium and athletic track. We got to sit where the VIPs would sit. We got to experience the walk that the football teams take before they enter the pitch, as well as seeing where they warm up and the locker rooms and stand beside the running track and pitch.

In the evening we went to Tempelhof airport which played a huge role in the Berlin Airlift. It was where Trizonia (USA, Britain and France) would fly thousands of tons of supplies in for western Berlin each day, with planes leaving three main airports every 3 minutes. The most crucial part of the Berlin airlift was keeping to the air corridors. If one pilot went off course they ran the risk of being shot down by the Soviet soldiers. (The Berlin Crisis lasted for about a year before Stalin decided to call it off!)

Our first activity of day four was going to Stasi prison. We had a guided tour around and was shown how people were treated and what sort of living situations they were kept in. For example the bottom left photos show one wooden block which 5-8 people would have to sleep on and the bucket was where they would go to the toilet. The prisoners would also have to follow strict rules and undergo intense interrogation sessions which could last 24 hours.

On the last day, right before we went to the airport, we went up the TV Tower. It was very cloudy so we couldn't really see much or get very good photos of the views but it was still a very cool experience to go up a lift 203m to get to the observation deck.

A big thank you to our teachers who came on the trip with us - we had a great time!




The final score was 3-2 to Sandhurst! A huge congratulations to everyone you were amazing despite the challenging weather conditions! Well done girls you were amazing!




U12 Girls Football Group Winners


The girls came away with a well deserved 6-0 victory. Well done girls you all worked amazingly together and played brilliantly.

For all attendance issues - thank you.

At Sandhurst School, we firmly believe that regular attendance is vitally important to ensure the best possible outcomes for all of our children. Regular attendance means your child can make the most of their education, thus improving their chances in adult life. Being in school will also help your child's social skills, such as making and keeping friendships. A regular and punctual attendance pattern will help your child when they enter the world of work.

To ensure your child gets the best possible start to their education, we ask that you support regular school attendance and punctuality.

We expect all parents and carers to comply with all national regulations regarding student attendance and punctuality. Absences must be reported in the morning on a daily basis to the Attendance Officer via email <a href="mailto:attend-atte

If your child is absent from school for a justifiable reason, e.g. illness or medical appointment, their parent/carer must email attendance@sandhurstschool.org.uk or ring school on each morning of absence. If you know in advance that your child is going to be away e.g. medical appointment, you should email as above or you can write a letter giving the reason and details. You will be asked to provide evidence of any medical appointments and leave of absence request forms are available on our school website or can be collected from Reception. All unjustified absences will be investigated.

All students **must** sign out at reception before leaving the premises. If students are returning to school later on, they must sign back in at reception. It is your child's responsibility to report to Reception at the correct time in order to be signed out as Reception staff are not able to collect students from class.

Punctuality

Students should be in their first period classroom no later than the beginning of their morning registration time (8:30am). Students will be marked in 'late' if they arrive after that start time. If students arrive late for school they must make sure that they go to the main Reception to be signed in late. Punctuality is an important expectation of students and when they are late, they will receive a 15 minute detention for that day. Consistently late students will have their detention upscaled and bought to the attention of their Head of House.



FREE SCHOOL MEALS



School dinners provide a healthy, nutritious and tasty meal. Research has shown that a school dinner can improve concentration levels. Menus are changed often and can be viewed on the Bracknell Forest website.

By applying for free school meals your child could benefit from a school dinner whilst saving you money. But it's not just a free meal. When you register for free school meals and are eligible, your child's school will receive valuable additional funding from the Government, called Pupil Premium.

Universal Infant Free School Meals

In September 2014, the Government introduced Universal Infant Free School Meals. This means that all children in reception, year one and year two are eligible to receive a free school meal. Parents do not need to do anything to qualify for these meals, however if you apply for the pupil premium, your child's school will still benefit from the much needed addition Government funding.

How this additional Government funding is used by schools

This funding will be invested in your child at school. All schools will use their funding differently, for example some schools offer discounted uniform or help with school trips for those children who raise the pupil premium for their school. If you would like to know how your child's school using this funding, please contact them.

Who is eligible to claim Free School Meals or Pupil Premium?

All children in reception, year one and year two are automatically entitled to a free meal under the Governments Universal Infant Free School Meal scheme. However, those parents of children in these years that are in receipt of one of the following benefits may be eligible to raise pupil premium for their child's school.

Parents with children in year 3 upwards, in receipt of one of the following benefits, may be eligible to claim a Free School Meal for their child as well as the additional pupil premium for their child's school.

- Income Support
- Income-related Employment & Support Allowance
- The guaranteed element of State Pension Credit
- Universal Credit provided they have an annual net earned income not exceeding £7,400 (£616.67 per month)
- Income-based Jobseekers Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration & Asylum Act 1999
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit) and have an annual gross income of no more than £16.190

If you are entitled to Working Tax Credit during the four week period immediately after your employment stops, or after you start to work less than 16 hours per week, your child would be eligible for free school meals for this four week period only.

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


