

Sixth Form Geography Students



Early on Sunday morning our Year 13 geography students set off to North Wales to undertake four days of field-work investigations in preparation for the 20% coursework element of their A-level qualification. We stayed at the Field Studies Council Centre just outside Betws-y-Coed, a picturesque small town in the heart of Snowdonia, and a centre for walking and mountaineering. During the course of their stay, the students were taught by Georgia, a specialist geography tutor who is highly experienced in the geography of North Wales. The purpose of the fieldwork is to become confident in sampling strategies, data collection methods and the use of statistical techniques to test their hypotheses.

The students have the opportunity to link their personal fieldwork investigations to an area of their A-level syllabus that is of interest to them, either physical or human geography. We had an amazing time exploring the physical geography of the Nant Ffrancon Glacial Valley and Cwm Idwal, along with Llandudno, looking at urban geography themes.

I have been so impressed with the enthusiasm and engagement of our students - it is definitely not a 'walk in the park! Our days were long and action packed, starting at 9am, after a hearty breakfast, and finishing for the day after our last session at 8.30pm! We also certainly experienced all the weather conditions that North Wales could throw at us!

The students are now ready to work on their investigations on return to Sixth Form. We are looking forward to some great write ups and high grades!
















Year 9 Rugby Tournament




Celebrating European Day Of Languages ...
