1986 was a memorable year! The year when the Soviet nuclear reactor at Chernobyl exploded, the space shuttle Challenger disintegrated on take- off, the UK was gripped by Mad Cow disease and a full underwater survey was carried out in Loch Ness, in the hope of proving once and for all that Nessie truly exists. Argentina won the World Cup and economists warned of recession. In many ways the world has not really changed a great deal at all since 1986. But Sandhurst School certainly changed with the arrival of a young, vivacious blond with a thick Scottish accent and the name of Debbie Noble. And the school has not been the same since!

Miss Noble was appointed by the then headteacher Terry Enright as a Geography teacher but her undoubted skill in the classroom, appetite for hard graft and leadership potential were soon spotted and she quickly rose through the ranks, being promoted to the position of Head of Gemini House in 1990. We may never have found the Loch Ness monster but Sandhurst School certainly discovered a rare, unique and truly special individual of its own!

Debbie has given so much to our school but she has also gained so much too, including meeting her husband Richard. Three children later, Debbie, now Smith, began once again to receive promotion, becoming Assistant Headteacher in 1998, Deputy Headteacher in 2003 and finally the permanent Headteacher in 2013. 37 years of incredible service to our school!!

Many students over the years have chosen to spend their lunchtimes in her office, just to be with her. She made them feel heard, valued, and understood. Her door was always open, and she never turned away a child in need. It's that warmth and compassion that set her apart and made her such a beloved figure in our school community, for staff and students alike. Every morning it is like standing in line to seek an audience with the Queen as there are also so many staff who just pop their head in her door to share an anecdote, to ask advice, to confide personal news, to cry and to laugh with her. Even though she is horrendously busy, Debbie never makes you feel like you are imposing and always has time for you.

Debbie has always had high ambitions for our school and has remained laser focussed on achieving those ambitions since her appointment as headteacher. Always the first to arrive and the last to leave, she has taken risks, given opportunities and always led from the front and by example.



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As you embark on this new chapter of your life called retirement, we want to express our deepest gratitude. Thank you for your unwavering dedication, your infectious laughter, and your tireless efforts to make Sandhurst School the best it can be. You've left an indelible mark on this school and in the hearts of everyone you've encountered.

Are you entitled?

FREE SCHOOL MEALS



If children who are eligible for free school meals or have been eligible in the past six years (known as Ever6) are registered, then the funding we can access is known as the Pupil Premium. For every child registered we get £955 per year.

With this money, as well as providing a school lunch for those eligible, we are also able to employ more staff, creating time for extra support in Maths and English and have been able to purchase a new reading scheme. The continued success of the Student Learning Centre in supporting the pastoral welfare of some of our most vulnerable students relies on Pupil Premium funding and the ability to subsidise uniform or equipment costs and school visits for our students too. In order to register – first check if you qualify. It is not just if you are unemployed. Registration is confidential and will not affect other benefits you may be claiming.

You can check if you qualify and register your child for Free School Meals by visiting the local authority website:

If you don't want your child to have the school meal they don't have to, but as long as you qualify and are registered, the school still gets the extra £955.
