One of the things I have been impressed by, since joining Sandhurst school, is the number of guest speakers our students have the opportunity to hear from.

Last Friday our Year 11 GCSE History students were fortunate enough to receive a talk on the experience of Mr O'Brien who served during the 2003 Iraqi conflict. GCSE History students are required to study, as part of their course, a specific extract on this conflict. Having the opportunity to explore the case study with somebody that was actually there and hear about their lived experience, really brings the curriculum to life - I know staff and students found it to be a very powerful session.


What WE will do:

This week we say Happy 460th Birthday to the great Bard himself, good old Bill Shakespeare!

Shakespeare is of course a huge part of what we do in English, and I truly will never tire of teaching his works. At Sandhurst School every student has the opportunity to study three of his finest - the slightly mad A Midsummer Night's Dream, the tragic Romeo and Juliet, and of course the notorious and bloody Macbeth.


One of the things I love most about Shakespeare's work is that every time I watch or teach one of his plays, no matter how many times I've seen or read it before, there is always something new that blows my mind. My favourite example of this is how he indicates a character's social standing or sanity (or lack thereof!) by the rhythm in which they speak. A high-class character, for example, will speak in iambic pentameter (the standard 'heartbeat' rhythm of Shakespeare's plays), whilst a poorer or more mentally unstable character will speak in prose (plain speech with no rhythm whatsoever) to demonstrate their difference in social standing, even before you look at the words themselves. It also gets particularly fascinating when you find a character like Macbeth himself, who begins speaking 'properly' and gradually loses the consistent rhythm as he loses his grip on his power and decides that life is meaningless!

I think it's fair to say that he gets a bad rap sometimes from students up and down the country - and I do understand of course that the language is old, and many references are definitely dated - but ultimately, if you allow yourself to become immersed in the fantastic world-building and focus on his dozens of intriguing characters then both studying and watching Shakespeare can be an absolute delight.

And lastly, remember that he wrote plays and not books... his works are supposed to be seen on stage, so go and see any Shakespearean productions wherever and whenever you get the chance. The Globe Theatre in particular is a superb venue, and if you can handle standing up for an hour or two then you can even grab tickets for £5.

If anyone manages to get to any plays over this term or through the summer, I would love to hear some reviews... I could spend all day talking all things Shakespeare!

The high-quality programmes are delivered by professional artists and held in Hampshire Cultural Trust venues. Joining the programme will boost confidence, communication and social skills. It is fun, can make you feel great and is a great way to meet other young people in a safe and supportive space.

WHAT'S INVOLVED IN THE PROGRAMME

In this hands-on, outdoor experience, participants will join award-winning garden designer and social media influencer Leigh Johnstone, aka The Beardy Gardener, to learn about various aspects of gardening, such as planting, nurturing and harvesting, to help transform the garden at Aldershot Military Museum into a space of calm and tranquility. 
