Debbie Smith (Headteacher, Sandhurst School)

Debbie Smith retires at the end of this academic year after 37 years of unswerving, dedicated service to the children of Sandhurst School. This is an outstanding achievement and contribution to education. There will be few who have given more to the children of Sandhurst and the wider Bracknell community.

Debbie joined the school in September 1986 as a young, enthusiastic teacher and has worked tirelessly, whilst always having the children at the centre of her work. During her years at Sandhurst School, Debbie has held a number of roles as she moved into senior leadership. As a Headteacher and leader of some ten years, she has the most outstanding reputation for the care of her students and staff, always going the extra mile to support those within her community.

Debbie is fiercely proud of Sandhurst School and the fantastic work they do for their children. She has created a school with a wonderful ethos and atmosphere in which all students are welcomed and supported through their education.

Debbie has shown an absolute commitment to the children, the staff and the school and will be hugely missed by everyone. She has embraced the role of Headteacher in all areas of her work from the day-to-day care of the children to the numerous extra-curricular activities she supported and has constantly used her free time to ensure all children receive the very best care and education.

As a recognition of her work, we are delighted to share the wonderful news that Debbie was voted Teacher of the Year at the 2023 Pride of Bracknell Awards held at the Royal Military Academy in Sandhurst, on Friday 21st April 2023. We were thrilled to see Debbie's outstanding contribution to education recognised. Many congratulations to Debbie on such a well-deserved award!

We would like to this opportunity to thank Debbie for her commitment, hard work and dedication and to wish her a very long, happy and healthy retirement.

Appointment of Headteacher

Following Debbie's announcement to retire the school found itself in the position of needing to appoint a new headteacher. Our congratulations go to Gareth Croxon (Deputy Head, Edgbarrow School) who was offered the position and will start as Headteacher at Sandhurst School in September.

This was a hugely important appointment that was led by the Trust in collaboration with the Local Governing Body. As the Trust's first permanent Headteacher Appointment since our formation, we were delighted with the process which involved presentations to staff, assemblies, interviews with the student council and a number of panel interviews. All of which was run very effectively by the school. Our thanks to everybody involved in what was an exciting and challenging two days.

Ofsted – Edgbarrow

At the time of going to print for our last Update, Edgbarrow School had just received a visit from Ofsted and we were waiting for the official report. Well, we were obviously delighted to receive, in early January, the official notification that the school was judged as "outstanding" in all areas. Many congratulations to Stuart Matthews (Headteacher), all the staff, the children and the governors. It was truly a team effort and a very well-deserved outcome.

More recently, at the Pride of Bracknell Awards, held in April, Edgbarrow School gained Silver Award in the School of the Year category. Once again, congratulations to everyone concerned.

Infant School Headteacher

In our last update, we shared with you our intention to create the role of Executive Headteacher across both Oaklands Schools. To date, we have not filled this role and we continue to review our options. Both the LGB and the Trust are very pleased with the progress the Infant School is making under Ellen Weston's leadership and we have therefore asked her to extend her Acting Headteacher role until at least Easter 2024. We are delighted that she has agreed to continue in this role.

Progress with Bulmershe School

We had hoped that, by now, Bulmershe School would have joined the Trust. However, due to some consultations regarding contractual leasing arrangements with Wokingham Borough Council our timetable has slipped. We are, along with Bulmershe, hopeful of completing transition by September. We have already started working together, both at school and governance level, and look forward to our future partnership.

Kennel Lane School

As we have mentioned previously, we continue to look for opportunities to steadily grow the Trust and we can now share with you that we are in conversations with Kennel Lane School with regards to them joining the Trust in 2024. Kennel Lane School is a Bracknell Forest School of approximately 200 pupils with additional learning needs and we are excited that they are keen to join our Trust. We will continue to update you as we have more information to share.

Governance Review

Within the Trust, governance continues to be an important area at all levels with a focus on the strategic direction and the financial stability of the Trust and our schools. The Trust governance review has taken place by the National Leaders of Governance (NLG) funded by the DfE. The aim of the review was to ensure that the board is fulfilling its core functions, fully compliant with regulations and guidance and for the organisation to be sustainable.

The key message from the review was that individual schools are performing well. The Trustees are committed and demonstrate great qualities and the governance system is professionally managed. The report concluded that the board is working effectively and identified some opportunities and recommended areas for development.

The Trustees have now submitted an action plan which has been approved by the NLG. We will collaboratively progress this action plan and evolve the content as the Trust grows.

Three-Year Strategic Plan 2023-2026

A core element of our Trust governance is the Three-Year Strategic Plan. The plan contains our long-term objectives that reflect our Trust Vision to deliver an exceptional education to all our young people; and Mission (to deliver outstanding outcomes, achieve sustainable growth and provide excellent trust services).

It also reflects the ambition and direction of the Trust and enables us to allocate resources to achieve these objectives. The Trust Three-Year Strategic Plan also provides direction to our schools with each school incorporating relevant elements into their own plans.

This year we have updated our plan in consultation with headteachers, chairs of governors, and trustees to ensure that we continue to deliver an exceptional education to all our young people. A big 'thank you' to all the leaders who have contributed our plan.

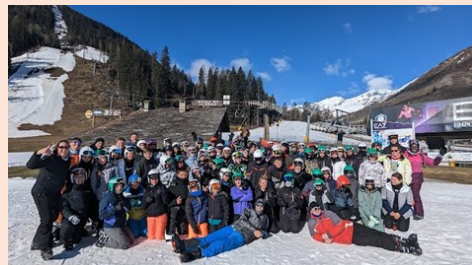
