


Set 'Goals' not 'Targets'

- Use of KS2 results may not represent a students true ability, especially after disruption to their education.
- Being able to predict with accuracy what an individual's potential is is impossible and does provide 'the opportunity to succeed'. Potential should not be capped or restrained.
- Learning is not linear, not being on target all the time can be a cause of stress, what matters is what small incremental change needs to be made to move the learning forward, for 'goals' to be set.
- The intention is for students to reflect upon their own progress, to enable their aspiration to flourish.
- Students will often surprise you. They turn out to have qualities, talents and skills that no one, not even they themselves, believed they had.






Attending Lessons

Impact of poor attendance

If in Year 10 and 11 a student has an attendance of **90%** this will mean that overall they would have missed the equivalent of a whole half term's worth of GCSE lessons.



It will be hard at times



Regardless of a student's ability or experience...

Their rate of progress will likely slow down.

Managing Academic Pressure

What a students can do to build coping skills?

- Healthy diet
- Sleep well
- Regular exercise
- Meditation and mindfulness activities
- Challenge your self-talk

- Make a plan
- Ask for help
- Start identifying and working on their own triggers early - before they become poor habits
- Try the advice they are given





It is natural for us to feel anxious when faced with something challenging or unknown.

It lets us know that we care about the outcome.

Anxiety is the feeling of being anxious *beyond* the normal. It is a clinical term to describe a person who where there is excessive feelings of fear, apprehension and worry over a prolonged period.



Beware the 'Fix-it Fairy'

Try instead:

- **Cheerleader:** always encourages; is peppy and has endless enthusiasm for what they know a person can accomplish
- Listener: doesn't try to solve the problems; they just let a person talk without judgement
- **Distractor:** recognises when a person needs to get out of their own headspace for a bit (go for a walk, play a game, makes a cup of tea)
- Hardliner: gives the reality check; suck it up and get on with it





Positive Learning Routines

Entry to a Lesson/Tutor Time	Exit from a Lesson/Tutor Time
Line up outside (if instructed to do so)	Pack away quietly and stand behind seats
Enter the teaching space in silence	Check area is tidy and clear of litter
Get 'Ready to Learn'	Wait in silence to be dismissed
Complete SILENT STARTER	Leave in an orderly and quiet fashion

T Levels - What are they?



A new qualification that is equivalent to three A Levels:

- > 80% of the course is in the classroom, learning the skills that employers need. The other 20% is a meaningful industry placement, where you'll put these skills into practice.
- > Designed in collaboration with employers and businesses, so that you will learn everything you need to prepare for the workplace – with more than 300 hours of industry placements.
- > T Levels give you the option to move onto university or a higher apprenticeship.

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Qualification	Entry Requirements

Entry Level	No formal entry requirements
Level 1	Range of GCSEs at grades 3-1
Level 2	Two to four GCSEs at grade 3 or above, including Maths and English, or equivalent.
Level 3 A Levels	Four or five GCSEs at grade 4 or above, including Maths and English, or equivalent.
T Level 3	Five GCSEs at grade 4 or above, including Maths and English, or equivalent (only at Oxford).

*Please note: this is a guide only as some courses may require specific entry criteria.
